# <u>Pneumonia Otherwise Known As Bronchopneumonia:</u>

Pneumonia is an inflammation of the lung, usually caused by an infection. The common causes are the many types of bacteria, viruses, and fungi. You can also get pneumonia by accidently inhaling a liquid or a chemical. People most at risk are those over 65 or younger than 2 years of age, or, have existing health problems, or immune suppressed such as transplant patients. If you have pneumonia you may have difficulty breathing, a cough and fever. You may have pain in your side or chest. Chest x rays, blood tests and sputum testing can help determine pneumonia. There are many types of pneumonia. One such type is Community Acquired Pneumonia which develops in people with limited or no contact with the medical setting. This type includes Chlamydia pneumonia, Chlamydia psittaci pneumonia, pneumocystis jiroveci, and legionnaires disease. The first one, Chlamydia, is usually contracted in family settings, college dormatories, and in camps where many people reside for a short time. Chlamydia psittaci results from breathing the dust off the feathers of any birds you may come in contact with.

Pneumocycstis jiroveci is a common illness of people with organ transplants. It resides harmlessly in the lungs of healthy people. In transplant patients who take antirejection drugs the immune system is suppressed and the pneumonia occurs. Prevention of pneumocystis pneumonia is done by giving the drug trimethoprimsulfamethoxazole, commonly known as Bactrim. If the pneumonia occurs, other drugs in combination with Bactrim are given. Legionnaires outbreaks occur when residing in hospitals,

cruse ships, and hotels. The organism is spread through air conditioning systems and water systems such as showers. People who smoke, take corticosteroids, or have an organ transplant are most at risk. Legionnaires can be fatal! Another type of bacteria develops a rash as the symptom of pneumonia, the cause is likely the virus that causes chickenpox.

The treatment of pneumonia varies as to the type of pneumonia you have, Antibiotics of varying strength can be administered, depending on the severity of the disease. Anti-virals are used in virus cases, and anti-fungals are used for mold or fungi attacks. Many times the cause of the pneumonia can not be determined and a combination of treatments is administered.

Prevention: Stop Smoking! Some pneumonias can be prevented by vaccination. Pneumococcal conjugate vaccine (PCV13) is given to protect against 13 of the known 90 types of pneumococcal bacteria. PPSV23 can also be given which protects against 23 other types of bacteria. The best protection is WASH YOUR HANDS!!

Taking a quick look at our roster, I found the following: We have 10 people with liver transplants from 15-27 years, 4 over 20 years; 5 people with heart transplants from 17-22 years; 1 person with a bone marrow transplant 19 years ago, 2 people with pancreas transplants 24 and 26 years, and 11 people with kidney transplants from 16-35 years, 2 people with 35 years!! These are amazing numbers!!! THANK YOU TO ALL DONOR FAMILIES.

#### **ORGAN DONATION: ARIZONA**

In March 2012, nearly 490 people at a Phoenix high school recently registered to donate their organs with the hope of saving lives. Horizon High School participated in the first High School Registry Challenge. The Challenge was put on by the Donor Network of Arizona, a Phoenix based non-profit working to increase the donor base in the state. When students become 15 years 7 months old they can register as organ and tissue donors. However, parents make the final decision to donate until their child is 18 years old. At Horizon, student leaders registered 489 organ donors. At least 1,300 people registered to be donors at four other high schools across Arizona. In 2010, Brophy, a college prep school, registered 800 donors in two days. The drives were run by students educating their peers and educators about organ donation.
