State of Minnesota Passes Bill Allowing \$2 Contribution to Support Education about Organ and Tissue Donation:

Beginning January 12, 2012 Minnesotans can donate \$2 to a fund which will help increase life-saving donations and transplants in Minnesota. Drivers can contribute when they renew their drivers license or ID cards. The new law provides support for the Minnesota Department of Public Safety Driver and Vehicle Services and Life Source to educate the public about the need to register as an organ and tissue donor. The bill was authored by Rep. Sarah Anderson (R-Plymouth) and Senator David Senjem (R-Rochester). Minnesota ranks among the top in the nation for registered donors, with 53 percent of drivers having already registered to save lives through donation, higher than the national rate of 40 percent. The bill after similar programs in other states that have proven successful. Other states with a similar check off program and higher donation rates include Colorado at 59%, Indiana 68%, Washington 71%, and Utah 74%.

Artificial Heart Goes Wireless.

Artificial hearts were supposed to be temporary stop-gaps to keep patients alive until they can get a heart transplant. Today they keep patients alive much longer. These patients are susceptible to infections at the site where the power cord exits the body. Researchers have developed a system of wireless power stations at home and in the office. The concept is a variation on inductive power in which a transmitting coil sends out electromagnetic waves and a receiving coil absorbs the energy and uses it to charge the battery. Researchers envision a vest that could hold an external transmitter coil connected to a power source. The receiver coil implanted under the patients skin would connect to a battery that holds enough power for about 2 hours, meaning the patient could be completely free to bath, swim, or whatever. Longer term, researchers imagine transmitters placed under a patients bed or chair allowing patients to sleep, work, or exercise at home unencumbered. As technology is developed, potentially the term would get longer.
