Wearable Artificial kidney To Be Tested For Safety and Effectiveness In Collaboration with FDA.

A wearable artificial kidney, designed as a new treatment for kidney failure, will be tested in Seattle. The trial will be done in collaboration with the Food and Drug Administration under a new program, Innovations Pathway. The battery powered wearable kidney in its current form weighs about 10 pounds and is worn in a belt around the waist. Dr. Victor Gura from the University of California invented the device. His goal is to free end stage kidney disease patients from being tethered for several hours for three or more days a week to a dialysis machine. The hope is to improve the quality of life of these patients. The wearable device takes over the blood cleaning functions of the kidneys.

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Emailing from the Head Of The Lakes Website

Artificial Kidney continued.

It is expected the patients in the initial study will wear the device under medical and nursing supervision in the hospital. If the device passes a number of checks, patients will likely then try wearing it on supervised visits away from the hospital. The artificial kidney connects to a catheter to filter the blood of toxins and excess fluid. The hope of the researchers is that such a device could, if necessary, operate around the clock, seven days a week just like normal kidneys. The artificial kidney has undergone preliminary tests in Italy and the United Kingdom. Quality of life issues will be part of the tests. Questions studied will be can you move with ease?, how do you feel?, How does the device or the treatment affect your daily life?, Can you go to work with it on, or go out with your family and friends? They will be looking a health outcomes as well as health economics. It Is hoped to provide a better solution of treatment with dialysis at a lower cost. \$16 billion dollars is spent by Medicare each year for end stage renal disease.
